Exposed copper conductors in a distribution box create a direct pathway for electricity, which can lead to electric shock, short circuits, or fires if the bare wire contacts other conductors, metal surfaces, or combustible materials . The severity of the risk depends on the voltage: standard residential circuits (120V or 240V AC) can cause severe burns, muscle contractions, or cardiac arrest if touched . Even grounding wires, though normally carrying current only during a fault, can pose hazards if improperly connected or damaged .

Common Causes

- Excessive stripping of insulation at screw terminals, leaving too much bare wire visible
- Loose or pulled wires from push-in connections or wire nuts

- Rodent damage, pinching, or abrasion along the wire length
 - Open or missing junction box covers, leaving connections exposed
- Safe Handling and Inspection
- Turn off power at the breaker panel before inspecting or touching any wiring .
 - Do not attempt temporary fixes like tape over live wires; insulation is the only reliable barrier .
 - Check that all wires are fully terminated in approved connectors and contained within the box. Only the stripped end necessary for the terminal should be exposed .
 - Ensure the cable sheath extends into the box per code (typically 1/4 inch or more) to prevent bare wire from being outside the enclosure .

Corrective Measures

- Call a licensed electrician for repair, especially if the exposed wire is live, damaged, or part of structural wiring .
- Replace or splice damaged wire segments using approved connectors inside the sealed box .
- Install or replace cover plates on junction boxes, outlets, and switches to prevent accidental contact .
- Maintain proper slack inside the box to avoid tension on connections .
