To connect a fiber optic cable to a router, you must use an Optical Network Terminal (ONT) to convert the optical signal into an Ethernet signal that your router can use.

- **Required Equipment**
- **Optical Network Terminal (ONT):** Provided by your ISP, it converts light signals from the fiber into electrical signals for your router.
- **Fiber optic cable:** Typically single-mode with SC/APC or SC/UPC connectors.
- **Ethernet cable:** Cat6 or higher is recommended to connect the ONT to the router.
- **Fiber-ready router:** Ensure your router supports WAN or SFP ports compatible with fiber input.

Step-by-Step Connection

- **Locate the fiber wall outlet:** This is where the ISP's fiber line enters your home.
- **Connect the fiber optic cable to the ONT:** Remove protective caps, align the connector, and insert it until it clicks securely. Handle the fiber carefully to avoid damage.
- **Power on the ONT:** Wait 2-5 minutes for the status lights to stabilize, indicating a successful connection to the ISP network.

- Connect the ONT to the router: Use an Ethernet cable from the ONT's LAN/Ethernet port to the router's WAN or Internet port .
- Power on the router: Wait for the router's indicator lights to confirm connectivity .
- Configure the router: Access the router's admin panel via a browser (e.g., 192.168.1.1) and enter ISP credentials if required . Update firmware for optimal performance.
- Verify the connection: Connect a device via Wi-Fi or Ethernet and run a speed test to ensure proper fiber speeds .

Precautions

- Do not plug a fiber optic cable directly into a standard router; the ONT is required for signal conversion .
 - Avoid bending the fiber cable sharply or touching the glass connector.
 - Place the ONT and router in a dry, ventilated area near power outlets, ideally with surge protection .
 - If the connection fails, reboot the ONT and router or contact your ISP for support .
- Following these steps ensures a stable, high-speed fiber optic internet connection while protecting your equipment and maintaining signal integrity.

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
