This anchors the clamp firmly to the enclosure and prevents movement (). 3. **Feed the Cable Through the Clamp** Push the cable through the installed clamp so that at least a quarter-inch of the cable sheath extends past the clamp inside the box. This ensures proper strain relief and prevents the conductors from being stressed at the termination points (). 4. **Tighten the Clamp Screws** For metallic twin-screw connectors, tighten the screws onto the cable jacket only, not the individual conductors. The clamp should hold the outer sheath firmly without crushing it, protecting the insulation and preventing short circuits (). 5. **Route and Connect Conductors** Once the cable is secured, neatly route the individual conductors to their respective terminals or bus bars. Avoid sharp bends and ensure that wires are not under tension ().

Safety and Best Practices

- Always use insulated tools when working inside a live panel.
- Avoid overtightening screws, which can damage the cable insulation.
- Verify that the clamp size matches the cable gauge to prevent loose or overly tight connections.
- Follow local electrical codes (NEC, IEC) for proper installation and strain relief ().
- Label cables and maintain neat wiring for easier maintenance and inspection. By following these steps, wire clamps will provide mechanical protection, strain relief, and long-term reliability for your distribution box installation.
