Fiber optic cables transmit information using pulses of light through ultra-pure glass or plastic fibers, rather than electrical signals, which is fundamentally different from copper cables that rely on electrical currents to carry data . The core of a fiber optic cable is a hair-thin glass or plastic fiber, surrounded by cladding that reflects light back into the core, a buffer coating for protection, and an outer jacket for durability . This design allows fiber optics to achieve higher bandwidth, longer transmission distances, and immunity to electromagnetic interference compared to copper wires . While standard fiber optic cables contain no metallic copper, some hybrid cables may include copper conductors alongside the optical fibers. These copper elements are used not for data transmission, but for purposes such as grounding, powering remote devices, or cable tracing . In these cases, the fiber handles the data, and the copper provides electrical support, combining connectivity and power in a single cable bundle. In summary, fiber optic cables are primarily made of glass or plastic fibers, and copper is only present in specialized hybrid designs for auxiliary functions, not for transmitting data .
